## The Expectation of Excellence

In early 1996 when Judith Bevan became the Standards Chair, the American Camping Association Southeastern had 307 total members and just under 120 accredited camps – the most in the section in its existence. The Standards Chair position was already a job needing more than one volunteer to fulfill. In reality, it could have been a full-time paid position.

In January of 2000, the ACA Southeastern merged with ACA Florida to become a larger ACA Southeastern Section. How large you ask? Well, 502 members and around 175 accredited camps. That's a big growth spurt in a matter of minutes. At the time, Helen Lingle, the ACA Florida Standards Chair, wanted to retire from her volunteer role as Standards Chair and still be active by being on the Standards committee. Thus, Jude took on 55 more camps overnight.

Today, the ACA Southeastern is 611 members strong with over 200 camps either accredited or seeking accreditation. That's a 67% increase from 1996 when she took the reigns of the program. Recently Jude told me that standards took 25% of her time! And no, we have never paid her – she has always volunteered her time, experience and expertise.

Jude is “retiring” from her volunteer position as Standards Chair effective December 31st, 2003, after 8 years as the Chair. She will remain active in the leadership of the American Camping Association. We would like to take this small opportunity to thank her publicly for the wonderful job she has done in growing the standards program and counseling many of you on various aspects of accreditation. All of you who have talked with Jude over the years, or sought her advice on your accreditation or your visits as a visitor, know that she always listens with an attentive ear and asks the right questions to help you. She always has time for anyone who calls, and if not, will graciously get back in touch with you as soon as she can. She serves in her volunteer responsibilities with ACA in a professional and humble manner and loves the challenge of helping others achieve their goals – big or small.

We hope each of you will take a moment to send Jude a thank you for all she has given. We hope it is known that the section staff appreciates her beyond words – she has made our jobs that much easier. Volunteer organizations only exist and get better when persons like Jude step forward and make significant contributions.

Because of the number of camps and the level of commitment it now takes, thanks to Jude's leadership, we are changing the way the standards program is administered on the section level. Gayle Taylor will be the new Standards Chair and will work closely with Julia Rowland in the Southeastern office as the staff person. Julia's responsibilities will be giving whatever is needed to the program to help Gayle ensure it runs as efficiently and effectively as Jude ran it. Again, thank you Jude!

We would like to introduce Gayle Taylor, the Outdoor Program and Property Director for the Tarheel Triad Girl Scouts Council in Colfax, North Carolina, as the new Southeastern Standards Chair. 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## Congratulations Woodmen of the World RC Cliff Payne Youth Camp



### Woodmen Lodges Receive JOIN HANDS DAY Excellence Award for Planting 92 Trees

Naperville, Ill., September 25, 2003 – Woodmen of the World/Omaha Woodmen Life Insurance Society Lodges 921 and 1091 in Randleman, NC, received the JOIN HANDS DAY Excellence Award for executing an outstanding project on June 21, 2003.

Woodmen adult and youth lodges, Boy Scouts of America Troop 532 and Boy Scouts of America Cub Scouts Troop 531 planted 92 trees to start an arboretum on the R.C. “Cliff” Payne Woodmen Youth Camp property. Although these trees are of many different species, they begin replacement of 397 loblolly pines that were destroyed by recent ice storms.

The award was announced Thursday, September 25th, at the 117th Annual Meeting of the National Fraternal Congress of America, the Association of America’s Fraternal Benefit Societies, at the Hilton Washington and Towers in Washington, D.C.

The Randleman project received one of 20 JOIN HANDS DAY Excellence Awards selected from thousands of volunteer events that developed youth and adult partnerships on June 21st. Each award winning-team received \$1000 and a distinctive glass award. Coordinating groups choose how the winning funds are used. Some organizations donate the money to the beneficiary of the project or another benevolent cause. Others save it as seed money for next year’s event.



“We had a great time getting dirty, and we loved watching the adults get dirty right there with us,” said Mark Case, Jr., 13, key instigator of the project. He is president of Woodmen of the World/Omaha Woodmen Life Insurance Society Youth Lodge 1091 and a member of Boy Scouts of America Troop 532.



In family conversations, his father, Mark Case, Sr., director of the Woodmen Youth Camp that lost all the pine trees, floated the idea of making tree replacement a JOIN HANDS DAY project. Mark, Jr. quickly picked up on the concept, knowing it would make a wonderful school project. He convinced fellow Boy Scouts and Woodmen youth members to help. In researching the trees to plant, they talked with arborists in nearby cities and learned that planting a variety of trees was better than sticking with only one species.

Mark, Jr. is a visionary. He dreams big and this was no exception. He said, “The more I thought about it, the more I wanted our campground to become a place for Scouts to learn the different trees. Then I thought, wouldn’t it be wonderful if this could become an outdoor lab for school groups and college students? Wouldn’t it be wonderful if they came to our camp to study forestry, to learn about trees and tree identification?”

And so JOIN HANDS DAY this year was the beginning of an arboretum that will eventually include at least two trees of each species grown in North America.

On JOIN HANDS DAY, in addition to the Woodmen Lodges, Boy Scouts and Cub Scouts, volunteers came from the cities of Randleman and Asheboro, JAKES of the National Wild Turkey Federation and the North Carolina ZOO.

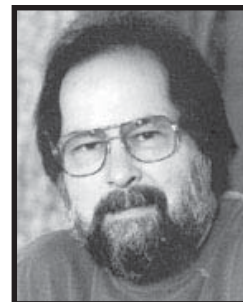

## In Memory of Mike Yaconelli

### In Memory of Mike Yaconelli

YREKA - Well-known Yreka resident Michael C. Yaconelli, 61, died this morning from injuries received in a one-car vehicle accident at approximately 8 p.m. Wednesday, October 29th, 2003. The California Highway Patrol reported that Yaconelli was driving a 2003 Ford Ranger pickup truck southbound on Interstate 5 just north of the Klamath River when, for yet unknown reasons, he allowed the pickup truck to leave the right side of the roadway where it struck a light standard. He was alone in the vehicle and no other vehicles were involved.



The news of Yaconelli's death came as a shock to the people who knew him, including many at the Yreka High School campus. Yaconelli was a former chairman of the board of trustees for the Yreka Union High School District and a strong supporter of the school and students. Beck said that Yaconelli was an absolute supporter of students - "the greatest one I have ever known. Mike loved the young people, was dynamic, and had boundless energy," Beck said. "He was passionate in his support of our kids and a mentor to many of us."

Beck said that he has been friends with Yaconelli for many years. "Mike was a major organizer of Young Life and Teen Edge at Yreka High School, a program I strongly support. He has toured the world as a motivational speaker." Besides his work in Yreka where he pastored the Grace Community Church, Yaconelli was co-owner of Youth Specialties in San Diego. Jon Hall, Teen Edge leader at Yreka High School, said Yaconelli was leading that Christian campus group (then known as 'Young Life') when Hall was a student there 25 years ago. Hall is now the Teen Edge minister and youth director at Grace Community Church in Yreka. "I am still in shock," Hall said. "Mike was a godly man that did far beyond what people knew." He is survived by his wife Karla and two sons and three daughters. - SDN story by John Diehm

## Summer Recruitment Ideas by Cate Egan

With the beginning of the New Year, camps are beginning their search for summer counselors. This is a challenging process because camps have to find the right person to make the chemistry work within the staff and programs, not to mention the cabins.

If your camp is looking for older staff members, college campuses are a wonderful place to start. Many college students are looking for internships and/or summer jobs and camp can be the perfect place for these students. Attending the many camp fairs that take place on college campuses across the U.S. is a wonderful tool – the ACA Southeastern website has a listing of all camp fairs across the SE ([www.acacamps.org/southeastern/campfairs2004.pdf](http://www.acacamps.org/southeastern/campfairs2004.pdf)).

Another great recruitment strategy is utilizing local high schools. Most high schools allow visiting recruiters to do class presentations, set up booths, or attend job fairs held at the high schools. Get your former staff involved! Providing incentives for your staff taking part in recruitment is a great way to have staff return and encourage their friends to apply. ## Top Ten Ways to Make Your First ACA Visit a Success

- Delegate sections of the Standards out to other staff to prepare. For example, have your Waterfront Director take the Program-Aquatics section (PA).
- Do the mandatory standards yourself. Find out which ones apply to your camp and make sure you're going to take a "yes." Missing just one will cause you to fail. To avoid extra laborious paperwork and lots of headaches, get it right the first time!
- Remember, you must include EVERY specialized activity. Make sure each activity — gymnastics, bicycling, archery, etc — has a documented supervisor, written operating procedures, safety orientation, and so on. Tip: see #1 above. Check the box on page 110 of the Standards manual to see if any more of your activities should be scored.
- Call your standards chair or your assigned visitor with your questions now! You don't have to wait until the day of the visit. It's not like taking a final exam. Ask questions.
- Gather blueprints, agency policies, insurance records, etc. from your main office and have them at camp.
- Gather your written policies, copies of certifications, etc. into ONE place. A notebook works well for many policies and procedures. Put them in order according to the standards. You don't want to run all over camp during your visit just to find individual pieces of paper. Get organized!
- Double check your mandatories. It's worth all the effort you put into it to be sure you've got them ready!
- Double check your written material. Each standard marked with a pencil icon requires something in writing. Make sure you understand what is being asked for. Call with your questions!
- Check with your section about arranging a pre-visit. There are a variety of ways that the visit process can work for you.
- Relax and be prepared to learn from your visit! Remember that your visitors are your peers. They are "camp people." They know what it's like to be in your shoe! There is a list of mandatory standards on page 226 of the standards book.

As part of a scheduled reprint of the 1998 *Accreditation Standards for Camp Programs and Services*, several edits were made. The edits do not change any requirements of the standards, but include some missed or confusing DNA statements and several other wording changes to make applicability and compliance decisions easier. The edits can easily be made in current standards books. As camps are due for revisits on this set of standards, they will receive a new book with the edits incorporated. ## PUBLIC POLICY UPDATE

There are several items of interest in the state and local public policy arena that will be of interest to camp professionals in the South this winter.

### North Carolina

The rules rewrite committee has been at work for over two years now. While the process has seemed slow, there has been significant progress, particularly in the area of primitive camps. A primitive camp is defined below.

*“a camp not served by any public electrical service providers that provide overnight outdoor primitive lodging. Primitive camps include those camp establishments which provide food or overnight lodging accommodations for 72 consecutive hours or more per week at a permanent base of operations for groups of children or adults engaged in overnight organized recreational or education programs. Programs are operated by the camp and/or supervision of individual campers is a camp responsibility.”*

In the current rules there is not a definition of a primitive camp. On September 30, 2003 the head of the Dairy and Food Protection Branch of Environmental Health Services Section sent a memo to all NC county Environmental Health Directors effectively stating that under the current rules primitive camps may not be given a permit, and thus must cease operations. The committee was warned this was coming and has been hard at work developing regulations for primitive camps. A draft of the “Rules Governing the Sanitation of Primitive Camps” (Section .3400) was completed by the committee on December 10, 2003 and is being sent forth for review and publication in the January 15, 2004 state register.

Once the rules are published the public comment period will begin. A public hearing has been tentatively scheduled for January 30<sup>th</sup>, 2004 in Winston-Salem. The exact time and location is undetermined, but keep an eye on our website for updates. Without any complications, the public comment period will end March 15<sup>th</sup>. Unless yours is a primitive camp, or you plan to operate one in addition to your current camp, these regulations do not affect the camp with public utilities, with the exception of the field sanitation guidelines, which will be put in place eventually for all camps in time. Look for a review of them in the next *Sundial* to come out in early February 2004. Because of the tight timetable so that the rules may have an effective date of May 1, 2004, the committee will be presenting the new regulations to the rules review commission before the end of the public comment period.

**With a very short period of time after public comments and before the rules review commission, there is a critical need to make all primitive camps aware of the new regulations. This is where we are lacking and need your help. If you know of camps that meet the definition of a primitive camp anywhere in the state, please send an email to Don Wood at [don@southeastcamps.org](mailto:don@southeastcamps.org) with the contact information. Our list is short with only 7 camps, but we know there are more that meet the definition, but search efforts have been done with few results.**

### Alabama

There is the possibility of a bill being filed early next year on uniform school start dates in Alabama. A bill on the topic was withdrawn in late 2003 after committee discussion. Academic assessments are required to be given to local school systems 30 days prior to starting the fall calendar under the No Child Left Behind (NCLB) Act to give families and school systems time to assess and make changes if a school system is low performing. In 2003, the average school start date was August 8<sup>th</sup> while test results were not released until August 14<sup>th</sup>. At stake is the loss of Title I funding (approximately \$182 million in 2002) for Alabama.

A later start date (third week of August) was part of the withdrawn bill in 2003. There is the possibility of a new bill being introduced in 2004.
